Although this process may take some time, DWER has confirmed that they are comfortable to wait for an opportunity to utilise a site with an ideal location within the Fremantle CBD.)</li> </ul> </li> <li>Other agenda items:         <ul> <li>Mark Woodcock said John Dowson had raised at the previous meeting the issue of historic wooden blocks on Victoria Quay. Neil Stanbury said he had spoken to John and Fremantle Ports was looking into exposing a portion of blocks if exposed and able to do so.</li> <li>Mark thanked Fremantle Ports for sponsorship of the Festival of Lights (Diwali) at South Fremantle in 2020.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	
1. Presentation: Victoria Quay works update	Dain
Dain explained the redevelopment of major works occurring this year on Victoria Quay. The works include:	
<ul> <li>Stage 1 A–B Shed sheet pile work zone (completed 2020); B Shed Leeuwin berth fender and bollard repairs, August – Sept 2020; O'Connor Landing fender Q2 FY22; B Berth deck repair and replacement (currently in progress; B Berth deck critical maintenance repair 200sqm planned FY22; O'Connor Landing critical maintenance (completed 2020); Stage 2 B – C Shed Sheet pile work zone (7 Oct – 29 Oct 2020); Stage 3 C – D Shed Sheet pile work zone (completed 2020)</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Fremantle Ports completed extensive foundation and berth works before handover to Gage Roads Brewing in March this year</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Gage Roads: Removal and replacement of asbestos roof completed by July; renovation and renewal works continuing for December 2021 opening</li> </ul>

Recladding of workshops west of Administration Building	
Victoria Quay wayfinding and signage renewal	
Refurbishment and painting of North Mole and South Mole lighthouses

2. Trade update	Michael
Michael, who has been CEO since May, introduced himself to members.	
<ul> <li>Total container throughput highest ever recorded at Fremantle - 807,061 TEU; total Fremantle Inner Harbour non-containerised trade up 0.12 million tonnes or 12%; new motor vehicle imports &gt;100,000 units, up 23,000 units or 29.4%; bulk business at Kwinana Bulk Jetty and Kwinana Bulk Terminal up 15.7% (0.48 million tonnes) and 7.3% (0.23 million tonnes) respectively. (More detail was provided which is also available <u>here</u>.)</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>COVID-19 update: 2200 ships have visited the port since the pandemic began 18 months ago and there have been no cases of community transmission through the port.</li> </ul>	
3. Westport update	Michael
Westport's scope has become clearer; Fremantle Ports is very involved and represented in the Westport Program; Fremantle Ports has embarked on master planning for trades other than the container trade; Future of Fremantle Planning Committee announced by WA Government on 13 June.	
4. Swan River Crossings update	Neil
4 options being considered (on Main Roads WA website); MRWA will make recommendation to the Minister for Transport in August on favoured option; MRWA will then do community consultation on the design; there will be no impacts on the port, other than during construction and to Small Craft Pens; construction would start late 2021 and completion dependent on which option chosen; bridge inspection works – routine inspection works on now for up to 6 weeks (not connected with Swan River Crossings Project).

A range of incidents and complaints were discussed, including a container truck rollover at Rous Head, a company on North Quay failing to ensure a 5-metre exclusion zone around its perimeter to aid in the detection of Red Imported Fire Ants; some complaints from residents expressing concern about COVID-19 ships in the Inner Harbour; two electricians working under Victoria Quay receiving an electrical shock; tripping incidents at South Mole and Victoria Quay.
